HBCCIC Strategic Framework

Vision

HBCCIC envisions a country in which all children have the care they need to reach their full potentials (cognitive, social, emotional, and health and wellness); providers offer quality child care; and parents have equitable access to quality child care for their children.

Mission

To achieve this vision, HBCCIC will remove policy barriers, strengthen home-based child care practices and business models, and support the growth and recognition of the sector so that all providers offer quality care and parents choose quality care.

Objectives

Identify, test, and scale activities that improve quality, access, sustainability, and equity for providers and their supporting infrastructures

Use innovative strategies to develop new practices and programs that improve home-based care and are co-designed with parents and providers

Support, scale, and foster the enabling environment for quality, accessible, sustainable, and equitable HBCC

Overview of the Four Pillars



Core Practices

Core practices are activities and approaches supported by some evidence that they contribute to high-quality, sustainable, accessible, and equitable home-based child care.

Pillar Outcomes: Core practices are identified and scaled.



Innovation

Innovation refers to the tools that drive people to test or advance toward better solutions than the current ones available that also reflect the needs expressed by users (e.g., providers or parents).

Pillar Outcomes: Innovation tools spark development of new practices and programs that improve home-based care.



Measurement

Measurement is the process of defining outcomes and indicators of improvement in home-based care.

Pillar Outcomes: The HBCC sector has access to a shared set of metrics and understands which practices are most effective; and this collaborative has a process for tracking progress and course correcting




Policy

Policies are the federal and state regulatory and administrative decisions that govern home-based child care providers.

Pillar Outcomes: Federal and state policies provide adequate funding, scale and sustain core practices, and reflect parent and provider voices and priorities.
